

## **Brief History of Funding for Bebor Model Nursery/Primary School**

### BACKGROUND:

Bebor Model Nursery/Primary School (BMN/PS) has three main campuses, all of which are in Rivers State, Nigeria. The original school is in Bodo, while the second extension campus is in Bane and the third extension campus is in Bori. Bane and Bodo are both rural Ogoni villages comprised overwhelmingly of subsistence farmers and fishermen. Bori is the “commercial capital” and main transit junction for the rest of Ogoni and is located between Bodo and Bane. We did not begin supporting the Bane school until March 2003 and we did not begin supporting the Bori school until July 2012. In 2015, we extended our health program (now also our scholarship program) to St. Patrick’s Nursery and Primary School which is a Catholic school in Bodo. In 2019, we extended our health program (now also our nutrition and scholarship programs) to Our Lady’s Nursery and Primary School which is an extension of St. Patrick’s in K-Dere (about 10 minutes-drive from Bodo). In 2020, we extended our health program (now also our nutrition and scholarship programs) to St. Bernard’s Catholic Nursery and Primary School in Biara (about 10 minutes-drive from Bodo). In 2025, we extended our health and scholarship programs to St. Brigid’s Nursery and Primary School (also in Bodo). As such, the first three rounds of funding all went to Bodo. Subsequent funding rounds between 2003-2011 were generally divided equally between the two schools in Bane and Bodo, although depending on the specific status and needs of projects at each school, one school may have received more than the other school in any given funding round or funding may have been sent exclusively to one school and not the other. Our first support for the school in Bori was sent in 2012. Our first support for St. Patrick’s was sent in 2017, our first support for Our Lady’s in K-Dere was sent in 2019, our first support for St. Bernard’s in Biara was sent in 2020 and our first support for St. Brigid’s was sent in 2025.

Before the International Friends Committee/Timmy Global Health got involved, BMN/PS received approximately \$10,000 from the Canadian consulate general in Lagos which partially finished construction of a 5-classroom primary school building in Bodo. The school in Bori also had two partially finished classroom buildings before we started helping them. St. Patrick’s, St. Bernard’s and St. Brigid’s had most of their basic infrastructure in place before we started supporting them. Our Lady’s Nursery and Primary School still lacks basic infrastructure.

The figures below were divided up and disbursed in the local Nigerian currency, the Naira. As such, the US\$ figures are approximations of how the Naira funding provided translates into dollars. A few figures have also been rounded up or down slightly.

The International Friends Committee/Timmy Global Health started its fundraising efforts in October 2000. To date, \$435,035 has been delivered to the schools in 63 rounds of funding:

7 <sup>th</sup>	August 2005	\$7,000	Continued work on the buildings in Bane and Bodo, provided tuition fee scholarship funding for poor children at both schools.
8 <sup>th</sup>	April 2006	\$6,000	\$4,000 went to Bodo to start work on building boys, girls and teachers' latrines for the school. \$2,000 went to Bane to bring the building up to the point where all that is left is putting on the roof and putting in the cement floor.
9 <sup>th</sup>	August 2006	\$9,900	\$4,000 went to Bane to put a rust-roof on the final classroom building (\$2,500 of this was provided by the Timmy Foundation). \$3,600 (provided by the Timmy Foundation) went to the Tijen Pegg Mothers Association in Bodo to establish a sewing machine workshop or co-op. \$1,000 went to Bodo to continue work toward finishing the third and final classroom building. \$1,000 was divided evenly between both schools to

provide tuition fee scholarship funding for the poorest pupils. \$200 was given to the school director in Bodo to cover postage, transportation and other expenses. \$100 was an earmarked donation from a specific donor to purchase Bibles.

11 <sup>th</sup>	May 2007	\$3,000	Continued work on the third building in Bodo.
12 <sup>th</sup>	November 2007	\$5,000	\$3,000 to finish work on the second building in Bane. \$1,000 for tuition fee scholarships in Bane and \$1,000 for tuition fee scholarships in Bodo.
13 <sup>th</sup>	February 2008	\$4,000	Continued work on the third building in Bodo.
14 <sup>th</sup>	August 2008	\$4,000	Finish work on the third building in Bodo and begin building a fence around the school's property.
15 <sup>th</sup>	November 2008	\$4,500	\$4,000 to finish work on latrines in Bodo and \$500 to commission a report on how the major oil spill in Bodo affected children at the school and their families.
16 <sup>th</sup>	April 2009	\$5,900	Provided by our partners at Stepping Stones Nigeria (now Safe Child Africa) to install a borehole for drinking water at the school in Bodo and a tap just outside the school for the use of community members.
17 <sup>th</sup>	July 2009	\$8,000	\$3,000 of scholarship funding divided evenly between the two schools (Bane and Bodo). \$3,333 for a permanent home for the Tijen Pegg Mothers' Association sewing machine workshop (Bodo). \$667 for band equipment for the Pat and Gerry Neils Memorial Band (Bodo). \$667 for band equipment for the Jim Wark Half Century Band (Bane). \$333 to commission a report on the quality of the drinking water provided by the new borehole in Bodo.

20 <sup>th</sup>	July 2010	\$6,000	To re-roof the first primary school building in Bodo with a rust proof aluminum zinc roof.

27 <sup>th</sup>	October 2013	\$9,750	\$3,750 is the first half of our 2013-2014 academic year health program funding in Bodo + \$1,500 in additional help to re-roof the final classroom building in Bodo with a rust-proof aluminum zinc roof + \$4,500 to install a borehole for cleaner and improved drinking water at the school in Bori.
28 <sup>th</sup>	May 2014	\$3,750	\$3,750 is the second half of our 2013-2014 academic year health program funding in Bodo.
29 <sup>th</sup>	October 2014	\$6,050	\$4,750 is for our expanded 2014-2015 academic year health program funding in Bodo. \$1,300 is specified and dedicated donations to help our school director in Bodo with funeral and medical expenses after the death of his infant son.
30 <sup>th</sup>	May 2015	\$6,000	The bulk of this funding is to finish re-roofing the assembly hall building in Bodo with a rust-proof roof. Smaller portions of it are to purchase a new generator and a new borehole pumping machine to get the borehole for cleaner drinking water working again, in Bodo.
31 <sup>st</sup>	September 2015	\$9,750	\$5,000 was to build a security fence or wall around our school in Bane to prevent vehicles from driving through the school grounds and to reduce the chances of any of the female students being attacked when using the toilets. \$4,750 was the first half of our health program funding for the 2015-16 academic year.
32 <sup>nd</sup>	April 2016	\$4,750	The second half of our health program funding for the 2015-16 academic year.
33 <sup>rd</sup>	October 2016	\$6,350	The first half of our health program funding for the 2016-17 academic + \$1,000 in scholarship funding for our school in Bodo and \$600 for purchasing a new generator for our school in Bodo.

Bodo.

36 <sup>th</sup>	August 2017	\$6,500	\$2,200 to construct and equip three sickbays (Bane, Bori, St. Patrick's Nursery and Primary School in Bodo), \$1,000 to construct and equip a computer room (Bane) and \$3,300 to start construction on a security fence or wall (Bori).
37 <sup>th</sup>	March 2018	\$8,400	\$3,600 for our nutrition program (Bodo), \$2,300 for our health program (4 schools), \$2,000 to repair and secure our borehole (Bodo) and \$500 in scholarship funding for the children of widows (Bodo).
38 <sup>th</sup>	October 2018	\$7,550	\$3,100 for our nutrition program (Bodo), \$2,200 for our health program, \$750 in scholarship funding for the children of widows (Bodo) and \$1,500 in scholarship funding (\$500 each for Bane, Bori and St. Patrick's).

42 <sup>nd</sup>	May 2020	\$2,750	Emergency socially distanced nutrition program feedings in Biara and K-Dere due to the COVID 19 shutdown in Rivers State. Combined with \$2,400 from previous round of funding originally intended for our health program which could not operate due to the shutdown.
43 <sup>rd</sup>	August 2020	\$8,800	Funding for our nutrition program at 3 schools (Biara, Bodo, K-Dere) from September 1, 2020 – February 28, 2021.
44 <sup>th</sup>	November 2020	\$6,200	Funding for our health program (\$3,200) and for scholarship support (\$3,000) at all six schools we support (\$750 to Bodo, \$500 each for Bane, Bori, St. Patrick's, \$375 each for Biara and K-Dere).

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**Overall summary:** 63 rounds of funding; \$435,035 worth of funding delivered by the International Friends Committee/Timmy Global Health + \$12,100 worth of funding delivered by Stepping Stones Nigeria (now Safe Child Africa) = \$447,135 of total funding.

**Our \$447,135 of total funding resulted in:**

- 4 partially finished classroom buildings completed (1 in Bodo, 2 in Bori, 1 at St. Bernard's);
- 4 classroom buildings built from the ground up (2 in Bane, 2 in Bodo);
- sewing machine workshop established (Bodo);
- 8 classroom buildings (3 in Bodo, 2 in Bane, 2 in Bori, 1 in Biara) roofed or re-roofed with rust-proof aluminum zinc roofs;
- construction completed on three sets of boys, girls and teachers' toilets (1 each in Bane, Bodo and Bori);
- construction completed on four boreholes for drinking water (1 each in Bane, Biara, Bodo and Bori);
- 2 security fences or walls constructed (Bodo, Bane) + 1 under construction (Bori);
- music equipment provided for two parade bands (1 in Bane, 1 in Bodo);
- tuition fee scholarships for hundreds of poor students since 2002;
- comprehensive scholarships for disabled students (Bodo) since 2021;
- purchase of 4 new portable generators (3 in Bodo, 1 in Bane);
- pilot health program for 100 students started in the 2012-2013 academic year (Bodo) which has gradually expanded to providing deworming treatment and basic immunizations (polio, measles, typhoid, yellow fever, Vitamin A supplements) to more than 1,700+ children at all seven schools we support;
- 6 sickbays equipped and supplied annually (Bane, Bodo, Bori, St. Bernard's, St. Brigid's, St. Patrick's);
- 4 plots of land purchased in K-Dere for the permanent home of Our Lady's Nursery and Primary School;
- pilot nutrition program for 50 students in Bodo (started in 2017); expanded and converted to a socially distanced nutrition program which continued after the COVID 19 shutdown of schools in Rivers State at three schools (Biara, Bodo and K-Dere) in 2020; currently running at three schools (Biara, Bodo and K-Dere).

Note: Stepping Stones Nigeria (now Safe Child Africa) has also provided its own assistance in terms of scholarship funding for the poorest and most vulnerable students in Bodo. Universal Learning Solutions has also provided teacher training and other support. Those figures are not included here.
